Headteacher's Message

Dear Parent/Carer,

It is hard to believe that half a term has already passed! The school has been busy with Curriculum Evening which was established to share the work that we are doing with your child and to look at ways in which you can support. The evening also enabled us to follow up on the information we had shared on changes to reporting, assessment and progress. I hope that these have been of value. The evening also shared with parents the work of the school on our Virtual Learning Environment (FROG), where, following a phased introduction, you will shortly be able to see for yourself what homework has been set for your child. Although there have been significant improvements in the completion of homework, some concerns do remain and we are presently looking at post school prep time for all students to support them in securing the very best grades they can.

Please keep in your thoughts and prayers all of the sixth form student who are currently seeking places at university – we have previously been very successful with our applications and were delighted to secure an ALPS grading of 'Outstanding 'again this year.

I am pleased to inform you that we have recruited a new Chaplain, Mr Ryan. He joins us on 9th November 2015. I am grateful to Fr. David Evans, our Chair of Governors and Parish Priest at St. Elizabeth's and to Fr. Andrew, from the Parish of Our Lady and St. Joseph, for their continued support during this time of transition.

Our Catholic life is an important part of the work of the school and it was wonderful to see the Year 7 students receiving their Bibles and the sixth form being commissioned as prefects. Our morning Mass each Tuesday at 8am is open to all.

As we prepare for Advent, the school will continue to support our existing charities and we will be looking to support from the school community for Providence Row, Hackney Food Bank and CAFOD.

Finally, we are now making rapid progress towards the building of the extension to house our Learning Support facilities, including a library and some additional classrooms. <u>Marking and Feedback:</u> How to make progress at Cardinal Pole

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Red Box Marking

HOW DOES IT WORK?

The class teacher will identify strengths in the answer and an area for developmentThis will be formed as a question with a red box to enable the student to improve their response WHAT CAN PARENTS DO?

Check your child has no empty red boxes! Are they confident with their response?When they are completing their next assignment, remind them which skills they need to focus on developing based on their last response.

Success Criteria

HOW DOES IT WORK?

- Students are given a checklist of what they need to include in their answer
- They and/or the teacher can then check off the skills they have shown in their response

WHAT CAN PARENTS DO?

- Go through success criteria with your child when they have finished a piece of work and ask them to identify where they have shown the skills before handing it in.
- When they are completing their next assignment, remind them which skills they need to focus on developing based on their last response.

<u>`Look, Miss/Sir I can...'</u> **HOW DOES IT WORK?**

- Students highlight the different parts of their answer to show the different skills on display.
- They then give a key to show what they are doing and what they need to do next time.

WHAT CAN PARENTS DO?

- Ask your child to identify what each colour means and explain how they have shown the skill.
- When they are completing their next assignment, remind them which skills they need to focus on developing based on their last response.



As part of our literacy initiative all students in year 7 and 8 take part in the Accelerated Reader programme. Below is a basic guide to how Accelerated Reader works.

Accelerated Reading is a computer based program which monitors a child's independent reading practise, both in comprehension and reading skills. The student takes a test three times a year, which gives a reading level. The Accelerated Reader program allows them to pick a book of their own choice, within that level, and allows them to read the book at their own pace.

Throughout the year students take quizzes on the books they are reading (An ideal score is 85% or above). The teacher will get feedback based on the quiz results. As the child gets better at reading their levels will go up as their reading improves. The books are colour coded so that they can identify their reading band.

Books are available in the school library, but students are also able to use their own book and can check if they are on Accelerated Reader by looking at AR Book finder on the following link http://www.arbookfind.co.uk/

Our expectation is that each pupil finishes a book in two weeks (at least 20 minutes reading a day should enable them to do this).

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Drop Everything And Read

Following the success of 'Drop Everything and Read' last year, it has now become a weekly part of the school timetable, ensuring that the pupils have at least 20 minutes of reading time during lessons a week.

As part of our whole-school focus on improving literacy, we require the pupils to have their own reading books as part of their daily equipment and ask that they are also reading at home as much as possible, ideally for 20 minutes a day.

Reading regularly for pleasure has been shown to improve pupil achievement in every subject. Please support this initiative further at home by reading regularly with your child, discussing books and checking they are regularly quizzing if they are on the Accelerated Reader programme (Year 7 and 8).

Bookbuzz is a reading programme from the Booktrust, which supports schools to encourage reading for pleasure, independent choice and develop a whole school reading culture.

Following its success last year, Year 7 and Year 8 pupils will once again be participating in Bookbuzz this term. Pupils will have the opportunity to choose their own book from a list of 17 titles selected by a panel of experts, suitable for ages 11 - 13.

Each pupil will receive a book and bookmark to keep. Pupils will use the Bookbuzz resources and activity sheets provided to promote the enjoyment of reading during registration. They also have access to the website which is packed with a wealth of information, including extracts from the books, a film featuring the Bookbuzz authors, downloadable resources and exclusive competitions. National Poetry Week

In celebration of National Poetry Day on 8th October 2015, which was focused on the theme of 'light' – Cardinal Pole has enjoyed a week of poetry, dedicated to both its study and creation. Cardinal Pole is one of a select group of London schools that employs a poet-in-residence whose role is to facilitate poetry writing, and thinking around the subject, encouraging students to express themselves through poetry. This experience greatly benefits the students in terms of their emotional, literacy and academic achievements.

Our 'poetry week' was a multi-faceted experience which involved a variety of activities dedicated to poetry. Notably, our poet-in-residence, Christian Foley, worked across a number of departments (eleven in total) on a 'pop in poet' scheme. This involved his appearance in a class for five minutes and providing an improvised poem on the subject the students were studying: ranging from microbiology to the names of Aztec warriors.

The idea was incredibly successful and has encouraged many students to rethink their attitude to poetry, but also to engage with their own subjects with renewed vigour and curiosity. MFL lessons were treated to poems in French and Spanish. We hope to repeat the 'pop in poet' scheme on a termly basis. Teachers who participated in the project have been overwhelmingly positive in their feedback. Additionally, students have been contributing to a school poetry competition, writing their own material of what 'Light' means to them, or using the subject as a springboard into their own thoughts; we have already had a large number of entries, and with still two weeks left to the deadline, the volume of entries will be further testament to the creative abilities of Cardinal Pole's student body.

Furthermore, not only students, but staff have been contributing their poetry, or their favourite lines of poetry to a notice board in the staff room and many poetry displays have been put up across the school.

During the week, Christian Foley, accompanied by our very talented 6th Form Poet, Tian Sewell Morgan performed a number of assemblies. The theme for our assemblies was St. Francis and Tian's impressive poem was written especially for the occasion.

Spoken Word Club runs every Wednesday (3.30pm- 5pm) and has been inundated with new members wanting to get into writing.

Christian will be working with local primary schools next half-term, so that Cardinal Pole's new intake next year will have experience in poetry writing, and will fit right into a school that welcomes the arts, creativity and self-expression in all its forms.
