

On Tuesday 28th November 2017 the new Blessed John Henry Newman Library opened at Cardinal Pole Catholic School, and as a result the students now have a fantastic resource at their fingertips and a new literacy hub in the school. The library is bright and airy, creating a calm atmosphere for students to study and use the library resources. Along with the librarian, the library will be supported by the students themselves, who can volunteer to become student librarians and help other students use the library effectively.

Through our library management system, students will be able to monitor their own usage and will be able to renew and reserve books and also write reviews and recommendations for other students.

To enable the library to run effectively the students will need to make sure the resources are returned on time and that they are kept in good condition.

As well as general library use, the library is also the base of our careers adviser, who has a regular flow of students who need careers advice and support, which helps to create a vibrant school community where students can grow and flourish.

COMMUNITY WORK

School Campaigners Urge Hackney's Renters to Have Their Say!



Some of our students have been campaigning for renters in Hackney to have their say in the property licensing consultation on the Council's latest measures to tackle rogue landlords.

Representatives from our school council and Hackney Citizens (the Hackney branch of Citizens UK) met with the Hackney Mayor, Philip Glanville and Mayoral Advisor for Affordability and Private Renting, Cllr Sem Moema, to discuss the proposals, which would require private landlords to have a licence to let out homes in Hackney's hazard hotspots. In May the students helped deliver a petition calling for such a licensing scheme in Hackney after the school council highlighted the difficulties faced by private renters as one of the biggest issues affecting families in Hackney.

The Council has since launched its <u>Better Renting</u> campaign to support Hackney's 30,000 private renters, including becoming the first local authority to introduce a voluntary letting fee ban and implementing a package of penalties against roque landlords with fines of up to £30,000.

And the latest proposals under consultation would mean landlords in parts of Stoke Newington and Clapton – where 20% of tenants face critical problems like dangerous boilers, exposed wiring or vermin infestations – would require a Council licence committing them to ensuring their property is of a good standard before letting it out or renewing a tenancy.

Landlords letting Houses in Multiple Occupation (HMOs) – homes with two or more households and shared facilities such as kitchens, bathrooms and toilets – anywhere in the borough would also require a licence.

Cllr Sem Moema said "It's been inspiring to meet with the young students at Cardinal Pole Catholic School and see not just their awareness of the issues faced by Hackney's 30,000 private renters today but also their commitment to creating change and improving our borough.

Up to one in five private renters faces appalling conditions in parts of Hackney, and these measures will give us the powers we need to tackle landlords who exploit renters and make sure their homes are safe, secure and well-maintained.

With less than a week until our consultation closes, it's crucial that all renters, landlords and residents who experience these issues first hand also respond to this consultation and give their views."

We've been working to improve private renting which is a big issue faced by students at the school and the local community. Many people do not feel confident contacting their landlord if they have problems so these changes could help them and make the community a better place – we want as many people as possible to give their opinions on the plans. **Serena—Year 10 Student Council Member**

We strongly support the property licensing scheme in Hackney. Many people in our member organisations are suffering at the hands of neglectful and exploitative landlords and we are determined to do something about it. As part of our literacy initiative all students in year 7 and 8 take part in the Accelerated Reader programme. Below is a basic guide to how Accelerated Reader works. If you have any questions about Accelerated Reader please contact me.

Basic Guide to Accelerated Reader for Year 7 and Year 8

Accelerated Reading is a computer based program which monitors a child's independent reading practise, both in comprehension and reading skills. The student takes a test three times a year, which measures their reading level. The Accelerated Reader program allows the student to pick a book of their own choice, within that level, and allows them to read the book at their own pace.

Throughout the year students take quizzes on the books they are reading (An ideal score is 85% or above). The teacher will get feedback based on the quiz results. As the child gets better at reading their levels will go up as their reading improves. The books are colour coded so that they can identify their reading band.

Books are available in the school library, but students are also able to use their own book and can check if they are on Accelerated Reader by looking at AR Bookfinder on the following link http://www.arbookfind.co.uk/

Our expectation is that each student finishes a book in two weeks (at least 20 minutes reading a day should enable them to do this).

Through their hard work researching these issues, the groups were able to create pieces of Drama which helped the audience to understand the topics and empathise with the experiences of the characters. The creativity of the two groups was outstanding and they worked tirelessly to ensure that they were performing in a style which would bring their subject matter to life in the most engaging and exciting way. We are really proud of the sensitivity and maturity shown by our A level group and look forward to them performing again in the Spring.

GCSE Showcase

Year 9 and 10 students have rehearsed tirelessly for their GCSE Showcase performances of DNA and Blackout on 11th and 12th December. This will be the first time that year 9 students have performed together and we are very proud of the start that these students have made to their GCSE studies in Drama. Blackout is a play about a young person who is struggling with a range of issues in his life. This leads to him making poor choices, but ultimately realising the error of his ways and changing his behaviour. The play is performed using ensemble techniques and showcases the students' ability to use stylised Drama. Year 10 are performing their exam text DNA which tells the story of how a group of teenagers respond to doing something wrong. Throughout the play we begin to see how different characters cope with the situation. The play is performed naturalistically and the students have had to develop their characterisation skills.

I chose this because it shows how black people were made to feel inferior and as though they needed to look different or act differently to be accepted. However, through all that, there was one woman who had accepted her flaws and skin colour and was fine with it.

I also chose it because of the media used to draw/paint the picture. All of the black people dressed in white were drawn using smooth, malleable media, whilst the nude black woman was drawn with rough, unchangeable media further emphasizing her flaws.

Debate Mate

Debate Mate run after-school debating clubs and currently work in 250 primary and secondary schools throughout the UK. Last year Debate Mate worked in partner-ship with Comic Relief and collaborated on our Urban Debate League Competition; students debated important global issues that are supported by Comic Relief, and in April secondary school students had the opportunity to attend a debate in partnership with the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation!

Students learn the art of public speaking and how to debate in a formal setting for one hour on a **Thursday**. The club runs from 3.30 to 4.30 in F014 for Years 7-10. The club is run by two mentors who are university students from top London universities. Debating is shown to improve students' critical and creative thinking; teamwork; leadership; empathy and self-management. SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

Year 13 Biology Field Trip to Wakehurst

Year 13 spent a day during half term at Wakehurst, Sussex, which is part of Kew Gardens. It is a beautiful location and the students saw some amazing things, including a plant that had been grown from a seed over 200 years old. The students used gel electrophoresis to analyse DNA from different woods to identify if the wood was harvested legally. The students were also able to walk around the site. The students were able to visit the Millennium Seed Bank and to go behind the scenes and meet the scientists doing the work of preserving seed samples for the future and to see where they are dried, frozen and stored underground and also where they are germinated to grow.




Year 12 Biology Field Trip of Wakehurst



This year we also took the Year 12 biologists to Wakehurst to collect data for their required practical skills in ecological sampling techniques. Despite a wet miserable day, the students spent time comparing the biodiversity of two different woodlands using random sampling and then using systematic sampling to see how the abundance of a plant species changes down a slope towards a river.

Year 7 Trip to the Science Museum

9 students had the amazing opportunity to see this year's winners of the Queen Elizabeth Prize for Engineering discuss their inventions and their role in digital imaging and to ask them questions. Of the five questions asked, three were from our students! Shaquan Nurse bravely started the questions off by asking the engineers whether holographic communication (as seen in films) would ever be possible. Pedrinho Vieira asked what the engineers thought the next greatest breakthrough would be, and Hiyab Bereket asked about the potential uses of virtual reality games. The engineers gave fascinating responses to the questions. Nobukazu Teranishi was so impressed with our students that he shook Hiyab and Pedrinho by the hand as he was leaving.
