My name is Michael Macaulay, I am 19 years old and went to Cardinal Pole School.

I achieved 100% A*- B at GCSE and left the Sixth Form with A,A, B at A Level to study for a BSc Hons Economics Degree at the University of Nottingham. Whilst at Cardinal Pole, I had a week's work experience in Year 11 at Stamford Hill Library and the same again in Year 12 at the Union Bank of Switzerland (through the brokerage + Cardinal Pole). The school then brought in the Brokerage CityLink to work with us to gain experience. I then joined the Brokerage Programme in Year 13 from which I gained a 10 week paid summer internship at UBS just after completing Year 13. Whilst on the Brokerage I successfully applied for the Bank of England Scholarship Programme from which I was awarded funding, a mentor and two paid summer internships in my first and second year of university. Since leaving Cardinal Pole, besides the UBS internship, I have completed a 2 week spring programme at Goldman Sachs and I am currently in my first Bank of England internship in the Markets Division. Throughout my time at Cardinal Pole I was encouraged to gain experience through the school's dedicated work experience programme in year 11 and year 12. Alongside this, the school introducing us to the CityLink Brokerage Programme really helped me build on my experience and put me in the position I am today. I would urge all aspiring students (irrespective of career/field choice) to gain some experience/an internship as it really does make the difference.

I am a former student at Cardinal Pole Roman Catholic School. Whilst at Cardinal Pole I was always given the support I needed for example; exam support via revisions clubs and breakfast clubs before an exam. I feel as if this was a crucial part to my achievements. I took the English Baccalaureate pathway at GCSE and achieved 100% A*-C. I continued onto the Sixth Form where I was not only given exam support but also exposed to several opportunities in the working world. Firstly, I was fortunate enough to gain a place on the HEAPS programme organised by Teach First, this included a four day residential at the University of Cambridge. However, this opportunity hasn't just ended there; I am now in the process of becoming Teach First's Campus Brand Manager at University of Leicester. In addition to this, Cardinal Pole arranged an assembly hosted by the Brokerage Citylink; A charity organisation who provide opportunities for talented young Londoners. This for me raised awareness about the financial services in particular, from this I secured an 8 week paid internship in Lloyd's of London at the end of year 13. Currently, I am back at Lloyd's for a 3 month internship in the Financial Crime Department and will proceed into my second year at University of Leicester studying BSc Economics.

Duke of Edinburgh Awards begin at Cardinal Pole.

Last year saw Cardinal Pole start its first year of training and supporting our Sixth Formers and Year 9s to complete their Duke of Edinburgh Award. We had twenty Year 9s sign up and eighteen Sixth Formers.

The Year 9s have been busily logging their volunteer, skill and physical activities. We will be taking the Year 9s that have completed all of their activities on a training and assessment expedition in the summer.

Our Sixth Form group all successfully completed their first training weekend in June. The group travelled to the New Forest to learn map reading, camping and navigation skills. All the groups successfully completed 3 days of walking, navigating and working in teams.

We are planning to get both groups to complete their final assessment in the summer term. We will then be able to award our first Silver and Bronze certificates.

CAREERS AND GIFTED & TALENTED

The start of the academic year normally focuses on Year 11s and Year 13s getting prepared for their post-16 and 18 options. The year 13s have had a busy summer with many undertaking prestigious schemes at top universities such as Oxford, Cambridge, Newcastle and Bristol, alongside work experience at Linklaters, Allen & Overy, EY and various Government Departments including the Treasury. These opportunities are key preparation for the completion of their UCAS applications.

Our year 11s are currently undergoing their options talks, which include where they are planning to study and what subjects after their GCSEs. I have so far been impressed with their ambition and the preparation that many students have done so far. However, the importance of ensuring they work hard to achieve the grades has been emphasised to avoid disappointment on results day.

It was interesting to see the reaction of the female students when one of the workers explained that if you are female and interested in this industry, there are a wealth of opportunities alongside being a very well paid industry.

Congratulations to our Year 10 students who have been successful in their applications for the UCL Horizons programme. Aaron Quidley, Janelle Frimpong, Natasha Agho and Roshana Roberts will undertake a 2 year programme at the top university. Year 12 student Shani Paul has also been successful in her application towards SOAS Scholars. Shani has aspirations of studying Law at university, so this opportunity should be of great benefit to her.

Four Year 12 students completed the Brilliant Club Scholars programme over the summer. Oanh Nguyen, Lessia Mbala, Ana Dos Santos Moreira and Tofunmi Kayode all worked with a Phd student to undertake an intensive piece of academic work. Junior Maths Challenge Success 2016

Students at Cardinal Pole Catholic School achieved 2 Gold, 2 Silver and 8 Bronze certificates in this year's UKMT Junior Maths Challenge. Over 250,000 pupils from across the UK sat the Junior Maths Challenge with roughly the top 6% receiving a Gold certificate, 13% Silver and the next 21% Bronze.

Approximately 6500 of the top students (Less than 3%) were invited to sit the follow-on competition, 'The Junior Mathematical Olympiad' or 'Kangaroo' and although none of our students qualified for the Junior Mathematical Olympiad this year, they have gained valuable experience and have done themselves and the school proud.

The students have done well in the Junior Maths Challenge this year with 20% being awarded a certificate.

Congratulations to **Alec Lau** and **Edward Badege** in Year 8 for getting a Gold Certificate and the Best in the school with an amazing score of 85 – Well done, **Alec** and **Edward**!

Fantastic effort produced by **Chris Hew**, and **Amari Gutzmore**, who each received a Silver Certificate.



Special mention goes to Boran Sis, Bianca Oguh, Elizabeth Adewusi, Viya Katula, Chyna Grey, Alicia Junior (Best in Year 7), Ashani Ettienne-Horne, and Shania Kahuni who all received a Bronze Certificate.

Girls Netball Club - Saturday Morning & Thursday After School

Since the start of term, the PE department have been running a girls netball club on Saturday morning between 9am-11am for girls in Years 7-9. The girls have shown enthusiasm, with numbers between 12-16 each week, giving them an extra two hours per week to develop and improve their netball skills.

Netball club also runs on a Thursday afternoon between 3.30pm-4.45pm for girls in Years 7-10 – All are welcome!

Cardinal Pole have entered in the Hackney Netball Tournament, where each girls' team from Years 7, 8 and 9 will play other schools in Hackney. Last year, the Year 8 team (current Year 9's) came third overall and are hoping to improve this to get in the top 2 this year as a strong Year 9 team.

Year 9 GCSE PE - The 3 Year Path to GCSE PE

At the start of this academic year, a new cohort of Year 9 pupils started the new 3 year GCSE PE curriculum.

Students have two single theory lessons per week, where they have learned topics so far including: health and fitness, consequences of a sedentary lifestyle, obesity, somatotypes, energy use and nutrition.

The group also have a single practical lesson as well as an afternoon practical intervention session every Monday afternoon, where they have learned the basic fundamental skills of netball as well as positions, tactics and game play, a new activity for the boys, who are showing much enthusiasm and interest, transferring the skills they have learned in basketball from Years 7 and 8 over to netball. Other practical activities they will cover over the year include Trampoline and Athletics, as well as Football and Basketball for targeted pupils.

V Certificate Level 2 -Year 9 & 10

A selected Year 9 and 10 group have started a V certificate in health and fitness at the start of this academic year.

This is mostly a theoretical course, having covered topics so far including: health and fitness, benefits of exercise and skill and health related components of fitness. Students have also had the opportunity to do a variety of fitness tests in the fitness room and out on the MUGA and complete mini assessment tasks after each topic to clarify their knowledge and understanding and to build up a portfolio of evidence over the duration of the course (2 years for Year 10 and 3 years for Year 9).

Students are enjoying the course and engaging with the material in lessons. The Year 9 group have one double lesson and a single a week and the Year 10 group have three single lessons per week.
