Dear Parents/Carers,

Summer seems a long time ago as the half term comes into view. It has been a busy time and there is a great deal to be proud of.

We continue to build on its year-on-year success and this year our students have enjoyed yet another set of record breaking results. Our excellent results reflect the commitment of our students, supported by staff and parents. Our A Level results remain amongst the highest in Hackney, enabling pupils to secure places at the most prestigious universities in the country. Almost 30% of our students secured places at Russell Group universities with many more securing places at other top universities.

I am delighted to also report that the students and staff rose to the challenge of curriculum and assessment change, producing excellent value added. At GCSE our Progress 8 was an exceptional 0.62 and top 3% nationally. The GCSE Maths results at 71% C grade equivalent and above, in line with last year's well above national results and national average this year, English results at 74% C grade equivalent and above was significantly higher than last year and higher than national this year. Other subjects secured continued success, exceptionally with Drama at 95%, Art at 94%, Computer Science at 100%, Business Studies, Geography, History and Science additional all securing 70% or more A*- C grades.

We have also had our new Library signed over to us with additional classrooms (see photos overleaf), which will provide state of the art independent study facilities for our students.



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HISTORY DEPARTMENT

Year 9

Year 9 have been remembering the contributions made by the 1st Football Battalion, formed in 1914, who fought on the Western front in the First World War. We have been looking particularly at the contribution of Spurs Veteran, Walter Tull, who became Britain's first black commissioned officer. An orphan who narrowly avoided the workhouse, Tull rose to be a shining star of the Football League from Clapton to Spurs and then to Northampton before rushing to join the army with millions of other men in 1914. Overcoming racism in an army which insisted that officers be of 'pure European descent' and the trauma of shellshock in 1915, he rose through the ranks of the army, impressing both his commanders and those he commanded. To find out more, ask Year 9 historians!

GCSE TO A LEVEL LEAP

MAKE THE LEAP!

The jump from GCSEs to Post-16 life is the greatest leap you will ever face in your education. You are expected to work at school or college independently, without much supervision. This means you are in control of the direction you take and now is your chance to thrive!

In order to become a great independent learner you need to:

- Set Goals
- Be Self-Motivated
- Be Organised
- Know How to Look After Yourself
- Rise to the Challenge

SET GOALS

It is time to start thinking long-term about who and where you want to be after sixth form or college. Visualise what it will look and feel like, then write your final goal on a piece of paper and place it somewhere prominent. This will help you see the bigger picture when you are studying hard and keep you motivated.

If you don't know what you want to do after education, that's totally normal!

Think about yourself in three years time and then ask yourself these three questions:

What will I have achieved in three years time? What will my day-to-day life look like? What will my friends and family say about me?

BE SELF-MOTIVATED

Now that you are independent, your time and learning is your own. What you do and how you will do it is down to you, and only you. It is easy to be distracted or waste study time, especially when you are enjoying your freedom! Don't forget the bigger picture and your end goal.

Use your diary or study planner to keep track of what you have to do and when. A great time management trick is ABC/123. A is urgent, B can be done in the next few days, C can wait for a week or so. You then rank your A tasks from 1 – 3, 1 being the most urgent. This way you can prioritise your workload easily and quickly.

There's a ton of great apps too, that create alerts and reminders on your phone.

KNOW HOW TO LOOK AFTER YOURSELF

Studies show that sleep plays a critical role in memory consolidation and helps the learning process. Ensure you get a good night's sleep!

Eating well and drinking lots of water will help you keep alert, as well as, feel less tired and irritable.

If things get too much and you feel overwhelmed don't be afraid to talk to people you trust – teachers, friends and family. There

ENGLISH DEPARTMENT

A Level English Literature

On Wednesday 4th October, 25 A-Level English Literature students journeyed to The Chickenshed Theatre in North London to see a performance of 'Doctor Faustus.'

Written by Christopher Marlowe, this is the timeless tale of a man who is prepared to sell his soul to the devil in return for incredible power. Desperate to learn the secrets of the universe, the scholar Faustus rejects his studies and instead turns to the black arts to discover hidden truths, but it's a deal that will prove his undoing.

Marlow was a contemporary of Shakespeare and the play has inspired writers and audiences for centuries. Cardinal Pole students were captivated by the very visual production that brought the language of the 1690s to life. All were keen to discuss the play's deep moral messages and the religious metaphors that run throughout. The journey back on the train was dominated by conversations about the seven deadly sins and how difficult it is to listen to your own inner 'Good Angel'. There are messages in the play regarding Catholicism and our students were able to reflect on their own faith and spirituality.

Students' behaviour and conduct was so exemplary that the Director, who was sitting just behind us, asked if our students could evaluate the performance to help him improve for future performances and productions. All gladly obliged.



Year 7 Transition Unit

Year 7 began the term with a cross-curricular project on identity and place: 'What is my Hackney?' Pupils went to the Hackney Museum and explored themes of local history, local writers and immigration in their History, English and Drama lessons. In English lessons, pupils studied poems from our own Cardinal Pole anthologies – written by pupils at our school - this culminated in a 'Stories of Hackney' piece of descriptive writing. In all three subjects, the pupils learnt particularly about 'Windrush' immigration from the Caribbean to England, as next year is the 70th anniversary of the arrival of the Empire Windrush. The pupils were then treated to a performance from a drama company about this historic moment.


