ROOT: "perpetualis" (adj.).

Perpetually comes from the adjective *perpetual* which came into use in the mid-14th Century. Perpetual originates from the Old French *perpetuel* meaning 'without end' from Latin *perpetualis*. Today, perpetually means to do something in a way that never ends or changes; something that is done constantly.
