

ROOT: "tremere" (adj).

Tremendously comes from the word *tremendous*, and came into use in the 1630s. Tremendous originates from the Latin *tremendous* meaning 'fearful, to be dreaded' from the term *tremere* meaning 'to tremble'. Today, tremendously means to do something to a great extent or to do something in an excellent or impressive way.
